Explore Moor: Nature's Miracles

This year we are exploring topics that will help us better understand the outdoors and our place in the natural world. And how can we – as individuals and as a nation – improve the situation?



50 Years of Ilkley Literature Festival

To celebrate our golden anniversary, we are paying homage to the inaugural festival and recreating some events from the 1973 programme, from a children's afternoon tea party hosted by Puffin Books to spoken word poetry in a local bar to a panel celebrating women in literature to an event exploring the life and loves of Charles Dickens. Plus, we are welcoming back writers who have become firm festival favourites over the last half century, as well as sharing a newly commissioned piece of audio theatre set in the year it all began.

2. Ben Crystal: First Folio

2023 celebrates the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's First Folio, the first printed collection of the Bard's plays and one of the most valuable books in the world. But what makes it so special? How did it save these canonical plays from being lost forever? What does its pages teach us about the playwright?

In this special anniversary event, **Ben Crystal** – actor, author and Shakespeare expert known for his performances in original pronunciation – takes us on a fascinating exploration of this incredible book.

Attendees will also have an opportunity to view the Craven Museum's own extraordinary copy of the *First Folio* originally published in 1623.

3. Lucy Caldwell & Rosanna Amaka: Love and War

Ilkley Playhouse, Wildman 12–1pm £10/7 concessions

Novelists **Lucy Caldwell** and **Rosanna Amaka** discuss their re-examinations of the Second World War from two different perspectives, exploring how love can flourish – and falter – under the threat of conflict

Caldwell's 2023 Walter Scott Prizewinning *These Days* is a moving novel about two sisters – one married, one in a secret relationship with a woman – set across four devastating days in 1941 as they try to survive the horrors of the Belfast Blitz.

Amaka's Rose and the Burma Sky is a powerful and lyrically told tale of colonialism and first love, following the life of a boy from a Nigerian village from the cusp of the Second World War to the Burma Campaign.

Exploring equality under conflict, is all really fair in love and war?

4. Samuel Kasumu: The Power of the Outsider

Samuel Kasumu was the most senior Black advisor in Boris Johnson's government until he left in 2021. During his time in Whitehall he became increasingly aware that he was an outsider; that his own experiences, assumptions and language were different to his peers in Downing Street.

Hear Kasumu share stories of his own upbringing and time in government as well as tales from other outsiders, both famous and less well known, and learn why he believes an outsiders' perspective can be a force for good: breaking barriers and trailblazing in politics and beyond.


5. David Crystal & Ben Crystal: Everyday Shakespeare S

David Crystal, OBE, is known throughout the world as a writer, editor, lecturer, and broadcaster on language. Ben Crystal is an actor, author, and creative producer and explorer of original practices in Shakespeare rehearsal and production.



6. Women and Literature: Virago & ILF's 50th Anniversary

At the 1973 festival, a distinguished panel comprising Margaret Drabble, Patricia Beer, Fay Weldon and Gillian Reynolds discussed women's contribution to literature.

To mark ILF's and Virago's shared 50th anniversaries, we are partnering with the groundbreaking feminist publisher to champion women's voices and celebrate the last five decades of women's writing. Join Sunday Times bestselling author Monica Ali (Brick Lane), Reese Witherspoon Book Club author Chibundo Onuzo (Sankofa) and Virago publisher Sarah Savitt for a talk on the outstanding achievements - and disappointing setbacks - for women in literature over the past 50 years, and what the next half-century may hold.





7. Jane Glover: Mozart in Italy

Mozart was just thirteen years old when he captured the hearts of northern Europe as a child prodigy, but his father was determined to conquer Italy. Together they travelled from the concert salons of Milan to the church-filled streets of Florence and Rome, to the carnivalesque birthplace of public opera, Venice. But how did these influential years in Italy influence Mozart's craft?

Join broadcaster and acclaimed international conductor Jane Glover – known for her interpretations of Mozart – as

she reveals how the composer's experiences during these Italian journeys changed him and his music forever.

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


8. Melanie Sykes: Illuminated S

Presenter and broadcaster **Melanie Sykes** has been a familiar presence on our radios and televisions for nearly thirty years, but only recently did Melanie receive a diagnosis that would illuminate her life: autism.

Taking the King's Hall stage, Sykes will shed light on what it means to be both a woman in the media and a neurodiverse person in a neurotypical world – charting her path from Manchester to LA, through scenes of broken hearts and sex, drugs and rock & roll – and how her diagnosis later in life gave her a new perspective, illuminated experiences in her past and helped her understand herself a little better.




9. Gregory Radick: Disputed Inheritance

Talk of genes is everywhere: genes for aggression, alcoholism and autism; for baldness, blue eyes and breast cancer; for caffeine consumption, curly hair and cystic fibrosis. You name it and there is, we are told, a gene invisibly pulling the strings, determining how our bodies grow and our lives go.

Historian of science **Gregory Radick** will take you back to the beginning of genetics to show that this way of thinking about inheritance is deeply misleading. Returning us to a bitter feud over the pea experiments by the "father of genetics" – Gregor Mendel – Radick conjures an alternative future for genetics.



10. Jonathan Kennedy: Pathogenesis

Covid-19 flipped our world upside down. But infectious diseases have been shaping humanity at every stage of our existence, from Homo sapiens surviving over the equally intelligent Neanderthals, to the Black Death setting Europe on a road to capitalism.

Dr Jonathan Kennedy, Professor of Politics and Global Heath at Queen Mary University, explores our startlingly intimate relationship with germs; how they have been responsible for some of the most seismic revolutions of the past 50,000 years, and how the crisis of a pandemic can offer vital opportunities for change.

Widely known for his stunning poetry, Armitage has also written for post-rock band *Land Yacht Regatta*, indie band *The Scaremongers*, and for film and theatre, including *Songbirds* and BAFTA award-winning *Feltham Sings*.

Join Armitage for lyrical readings, stories from his ventures into the music world, and an evening celebrating the music of language.






13. Sophie Pavelle: Forget Me Not


14. David Kynaston: A Northern Wind



18. Bob Cryer: Barry Cryer – Same Time Tomorrow?







Seni Seneviratne, Shash Trevett and Vidyan Ravinthiran's Out of Sri Lanka is the first ever anthology of Sri Lankan and diasporic poetry, shedding light on a long-neglected national literature and exploring topics about migration, atrocities, war, religion, love, art and nature.

Seneviratne is of Sri Lankan heritage but was born and raised in Leeds. Her work has been Highly Commended in the Forward Poetry Prize and

shortlisted for the Arvon International Poetry Competition. She was ILF Poet in Residence in 2012.

Trevett is a Tamil from Sri Lanka who came to the UK to escape the civil war. Her work has appeared in Poetry, Poetry London and The North and she is the recipient of a Northern Writers' Award. She was a 2019 Apprentice Poet in Residence.

Soundlandscape is an immersive audio drama with stunning sound design and haunting performances. The story is split into two halves and set across two time periods and landscapes:

A Dream of Death in Haworth in 1823 and Shadows on Shadows in Ilkley in 1973.

You can download and listen to both stories now at your leisure. They can be enjoyed separately, but we recommend listening to both (on the moors if you can!) to get the most out of the story.


Ilkley Literature Festival has been commissioning new work from great northern writers since its earliest days. In 1975, the Festival commissioned no less a poet than Ted Hughes to produce and perform a poem sequence inspired by the drawings of Leonard Baskin, *Cave Birds*.

As part of our 50th anniversary celebrations, we asked Yorkshire poet **Emma Conally-Barklem** to explore the echoes of our rich literary past. The result is a brand-new poetry commission, inspired by lines from Hughes' *Cave Birds*, 'Bitter Linnet'.

The poem traces threads of influence found in Hughes' work circling round Plath and stretching back to Blake and Brontë. You can watch Conally-Barklem perform her commission on our YouTube channel as part of National Poetry Day on Thursday 5 October.




